I joined Pro Patrimonio out of sheer sympathy for their cause. I had great respect for what they did and I was happy when I had the chance to meet the president of the organization, Serban Cantacuzino, when he was editor-in-chief of the *Architectural Review* magazine.

I then had a few projects, my own ideas about things like the project 60 Wooden Churches or the one related to traditional trades and the organization board adopted them as main project and, with their help, what seems like a mere thought or personal theory about how one might act became more doable and developed either along this line, or in partnership with other organizations and institutions.

The solutions to cases and interventions are always atypical and I couldn't say there is one particular procedure that solves the issue of heritage, not even in our intervention projects. We are overwhelmed by reality and we always need help and support because degradation is faster than our power to intervene. And mentalities or this way of understanding an intervention or broadly put, heritage itself, as a living, unmuseified, real activity you use naturally is sometimes difficult to understand.*

Vision

Architecture serves society. Saving heritage buildings and naturally integrating them in the economy of contemporary life, education for young people, recovered crafts and strengthened communities are the fundamental areas where Pro Patrimonio Foundation is extremely active.

The foundation searches, designs models, finds and offers solutions for heritage as an economic, cultural and environmental resource. Pro Patrimonio is a private non-profit organization founded in 2000, which offered through its projects expertise or direct assistance, upon request, where state institutions showed neglect or were not interested in intervening.

In the vision of the Pro Patrimonio Foundation, tradition is not a set of rigid values, it teaches us to learn about our own identity and culture that has shaped us, continues shaping us now and invites us to a balanced and practical way of critical thinking adapted to contemporary life. Thus, it encourages us to innovate, which applies to the cultural landscape to which we belong.

One of the fundamental objectives for which the Pro Patrimonio Foundation carries out a sustained activity involves the education and information of owners, communities and the general public in a spirit of respect for heritage buildings and historic sites.

What We Do

The foundation carries out a series of complex projects that span several years and whose main objective is the conservation, saving and reactivation of cultural heritage, especially architectural. The actions focus on practical projects for heritage protection and rehabilitation, as well as on the involvement and raising awareness in communities regarding their own identity, memory and the value of their cultural heritage.

An important part of the activities initiated by Pro Patrimonio is addressed especially to children and young people in sometimes poor and off-balance areas where we carry out projects to save, conserve and rehabilitate the architectural heritage.

The workshops aim at direct education and learning through experiment and creativity, regarding the heritage of architecture, memory, local identity, relationships between people, nature, buildings and cultural values.

The foundation is currently running several programs of national and international importance, along with a permanent advocacy activity with the authorities and consulting and information for the general public on *Baukultur* (built environment culture).

What We Need

The foundation's activity needs financial support and human resources. The period we all live in is extremely difficult for society, the priority being to keep our health and protect those around us. Culture, education and heritage values are part of the environment we live in and are essential for wellbeing - which includes a quality life -, for healthy and sustainable cities, for a mature and responsible society.

SERBAN CANTACUZINO (1928-2018†)

Founder of Pro Patrimonio, architect, historian and critic of architecture, son of George Matei Cantacuzino (1899-1960, a great personality who left a strong mark on Romanian architectural modernism), member of the Royal Institute of British Architects, Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE, UK) (1988), executive editor of the reputed magazine Architectural Review specialist in heritage conservation, editor and author of valuable specialized books, awarded for his dedicated services at the European Prize for Cultural Heritage (2008).



SERBAN STURDZA (n. 1947)

vice-president of PP Romania since 2010, well-known architect and restoration specialist, President of the Order of Romanian Architects (2002-2008), correspondent member of the Romanian Academy / Department for Art, Architecture & the Audiovisual (2010), promoter of learning through experimental workshops, interested in crafts, cultural routes, urban regeneration & public-space rehabilitation. Over time, he has gathered around him interdisciplinary communities in the spirit of cultural landscape.



NICOLAE RAŢIU (n. 1948)

Founder of Pro Patrimonio and Chairman of the directive board of Pro Patrimonio Romania, university degree in Naval Transport and Economy, businessman, philanthropist and lover of Romania, son of former Peasant's Party leader Ion Raţiu. President of the Ratiu Family Charitable Foundation, of the Ratiu Center for Democracy in Turda, of the Romanian Cultural Center in London, Member of the Order of the British Empire (2015).



CAROLINE D'ASSAY (n. 1951)

President of Pro Patrimonio France, member of Pro Patrimonio Romania directive board, painting restoration specialist, tireless ambassador of Romanian built heritage and craftwork.

60 Wooden Churches







he program began in 2009 and consists of emergency interventions and technical advice for wooden churches in 4 counties (Vâlcea, Gorj, Sibiu, Hunedoara), most of them cemetery chapels, often abandoned, all classified as historical monuments and in a serious state of structural and artistic degradation.

The program is carried out in partnership with the Order of Architects of Romania, the National University of Arts in Bucharest, World Monuments Funds and is included on the list 7 most endangered of Europa Nostra.

The name 60 Wooden Churches suggests the scale of the phenomenon; in reality, the reserve of wooden churches identified and taken into account is much larger. First aid-type

actions take place with a lot of voluntary work on the part of priests and young people, with funds from private donations and with the involvement of the local community. All these rescue operations also have a social dimension, which aims to reintegrate the church as a valuable heritage object into the life of the parish community by reopening, using and constant maintenance of the building.

Wooden Church From Urşi. 3 European Heritage Awards

- The conservation-restoration project of the wooden church in Urşi, Vâlcea county, included in the 60 Wooden Churches Programme, is designated winner of the European Heritage Awards/ Europa Nostra 2021, wins the Grand Prix and the Public Prize.
- The vision of this project, in which over 250 people have been involved for more than 11 years, is attributed to the architect Şerban Sturdza, president of Pro Patrimonio Romania Foundation. He has constantly motivated volunteers and involved specialists, and saw in the collaboration with the villagers of Urşi a constant desire to preserve and conserve the church left by their ancestors.
- Pro Patrimonio is grateful to the community of caring people from Urşi, to the parish priest Şerban Constantin Valeriu, to the volunteers and professionals who have supported the project over the years, and to the sponsors and individual donors who had confidence in a complicated project with many unknown elements and limitations. Thanks to all of them, this long-standing effort has become an example of best practice in restoring a European heritage.
- The main partners were the Pro Patrimonio Foundation, the Department
 of Conservation and Restoration of Art Works at the National University
 of Arts Bucharest, the Museum of Traditional Folk Civilization "ASTRA",
 the National Institute of Physics and Nuclear Engineering "IRASM", the
 Romanian Order of Architects, the Association 37 and the owner of the
 church, the Romanian Orthodox Church.
- May 25: The project to which Pro Patrimonio Foundation has dedicated 11 years of involvement - The Wooden Church of Urşi, Vâlcea County - is among the winning projects of the European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra 2021 Awards, Conservation category.



- May September: Running an intensive media campaign to announce the award and encourage online voting for the People's Choice Award.
- July: The re-consecration of the wooden historic church of the Annunciation and Saints Michael and Gabriel Archangels is held.
- June: Pro Patrimonio representatives are invited to the Romanian Government by Mr Sergiu Hossu, Head of the Prime Minister's Chancellery, and Mr Liviu Brătescu, Secretary of State in the Ministry of Culture. They talked on ways of promoting and developing cultural heritage in a sustainable way; on how we can turn good practice projects into public policies and how we can contribute to create effective programmes for the rescue, conservation and valorisation of cultural heritage.
- Pro Patrimonio requested, but without practical results: financial support for implementing the restoration projects of wooden churches in the villages of Şirineasa and Cernişoara, Vâlcea county, neighbouring the village of Urşi; Recognition and encouragement of traditional building crafts as an active economic and social factor in supporting Romanian culture; Creation of the National Museum for Architecture and Design in Bucharest on Kiseleff Blvd. nr. 35-37; Free broadcasting space on National TV and National Radio for the promotion of the award-winning project "Restoration of the wooden church in the village of Urşi, Valcea county", European prize awarded by the international organization Europa Noastra.
- May September: Running the national and international campaign to promote the Europa Nostra 2021 Awards and encourage voting for the Urşi Wooden Church conservation project.
- September 23: At the headquarters of the Giorgio Cini Foundation in Venice, during the European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards 2021 ceremony, representatives of the European Commission and Europa Nostra designated the winner of the Grand Prize, among the 4 Grand Prix, the Wooden Church of the village of Urşi, Valcea county conservation project carried out by Pro Patrimonio Foundation. This project was also selected by the general public (about 7000 EU citizens) as the most appreciated heritage project in Europe, taking the Public Prize. The restoration approach was an example of slow design thinking, active collaboration at local level, site-school for more than 250 people involved. The project also led to a better local understanding of the value of heritage and a sense of caring within the local community.
- October: Echoes of the Europa Nostra European awards won by the Urşi Wooden Church continue with the winning of the Grand Prize of the 2021 National Architecture Biennale by the President of the Pro Patrimonio Foundation, architect Şerban Sturdza.
- December: At the Romanian Athenaeum, during the Awards Gala of the Bucharest Architecture Biennale, 19th edition 2021, the Wooden Church of Urşi was once again recognized and appreciated at its true value. The Distinction for the Promotion and Safeguarding of Heritage was awarded to Pro Patrimonio Foundation for the European success of the restoration of the Church in Urşi, and the prize was handed over to Mrs Caroline d'Assay, President of Pro Patrimonio France.

Heritage Education



ne of the fundamental objectives for which the Pro Patrimonio Foundation carries out a sustained, constantly diversified activity is to educate and inform owners, communities and the general public in the spirit of respect for heritage buildings and historical sites.

Education is correlated with improving and expanding public access to historical monuments and the built fund.

Naturally, all our activities, put into practice through many workshops with

themes growing in terms of variation, aim at direct education and learning, through experiment and creativity, about the heritage of architecture, memory, local identity, relationships between people, buildings and cultural values.

A large part of the workshops initiated by Pro Patrimonio are addressed especially to children and young people in areas, sometimes poor and destructured, where we carry out projects to save, preserve and rehabilitate the architectural heritage (Golescu Villa in Câmpulung, Neamţu Manor in Olari, Perticari-Davila Manor in Argeş etc.)

"The School of Landscape, Art and Sound" at the George Enescu House in Mihăileni

- It is a cultural project of Pro Patrimonio Foundation co-financed by AFCN, partner UiPath Foundation.
- July: The Enescu House rescue and cultural activation project continues with the preparation of the outdoor space, the courtyard, by running two workshops focused around the notion of landscape and the practical and creative resources it offers under the name "The School of Landscape, Art and Sound".
- July 28 August 2: The "Landscape and Art Workshop" takes place for the redesign of the George Enescu House courtyard. The main pathway, a drainage ditch and decorative plant areas were rebuilt with 5 volunteers. On the last day, a call for volunteers was organised, where the core team was joined by a group of 25 children who planted decorative plants.

WHAT WE DID IN 2021

WHAT WE DID IN 2021

- August 23 29: 45 children from Mihăileni and nearby communities explored the world of plants and the surrounding sound universe through practical and artistic projects and experiments. Children built plant presses, planters and notebooks with handmade paper printed or impregnated with plants, learned about natural pigments and botanical prints. The experiences were complemented by more detailed sonic explorations of the voice in relation to the 'ordinary' sounds that surround us daily and of instruments built in relation to different properties of wood species. The end of the workshops was dedicated to the whole community, with games and sports competitions, a cooking competition with prizes, a film screening and a concert organised by the Music Academy Group at Casa Enescu.
- November: A short film became a full documentary about the "Landscape, Art and Sound Workshops", workshops that brought together children, craftsmen, adults and young professionals, invited artists under the umbrella of exploration, transformation and continuous activation of an ensemble with memorial and architectural value of local, national and European importance, the Enescu House in Mihăileni.
- November: We designed the "Enescu House Notebook". It is available in the Foundation's online resource library and in printed form at Casa Enescu. The booklet is designed as an interactive exploration tool of the Enescu House and its surroundings for visitors staying in the area for one or more days.

Crafts workshop at the Neamtu Manor in Olari

- September 8 12: A new non-formal heritage education workshop was held at the manor house for the children of Olari. This is the sixteenth workshop held at Olari since 2016, when the manor came under the ownership and management of Pro Patrimonio Foundation, until now. During the five days the children explored and experienced the crafts, materials and tastes of the place. They learnt how to use various plant printing techniques on fabric and paper and came into direct contact with three local craftsmen. They introduced them to the area's most famous crafts: pottery, woodcarving and reed mace weaving. The week ended with an exhibition of their work, a film evening and a cooking competition open to the whole community.
- February: 15 children from the Olari community took part, under the guidance of teacher Liliana Chera, in a workshop to imagine scenarios for the possible use of the future restored manor house. The children made a series of postcards with sections and views of the future community spaces in the manor house, and they also DIYed a postbox delivered as a kit with assembly instructions, open to multiple customisations and practical use.

Enescu House



he rehabilitation project of George Enescu's House in Mihaileni, BT, started in 2013 from the initiative of pianist Raluca Stirbăţ, president of the George Enescu International Society in Vienna. The adobe building has not only memorial value, it is also an expression of the vernacular architecture of the first half of the 19th century.

Since 2014, the Pro Patrimonio Foundation has coordinated the conservation process, involving volunteers from all over the country, the community and the central and local administration. By rehabilitating the Enescu House, the George Enescu International Academy of Music and the Study in Mihăileni.

The academy will involve musicians from all over the world, but also children from the area, giving them a chance at quality education and a cultural environment close to their homes. The piano existing piano in the house, a Bösendorfer from 1928, is also a donation: it belonged to the philosopher Mircea Vulcănescu. His descendants, Sandra and Măriuca Vulcănescu, through Despina Slătineanu, donated it to Vanda Sturdza, which, in turn, donated it to the George Enescu House. At the beginning of 2020 together with UiPath Foundation we launched the partnering program The Children's Academy of Music and Education, held in the George Enescu House in Mihăileni. The aim of this project is to develop the potential of children from nearby rural communities and the use of the George Enescu house, a historical monument, for educational purposes.

"Academy of Music and Education for Children" Programme

- January: We continue our strategic partnership with the UiPath Foundation for another year running the "Academy of Music and Education for Children" programme in the communities around the George Enescu House in Mihăileni.
- January May: The group of 24 children from the music education program that we started in 2020 participate in weekly online lessons. The music teacher gradually develops their creativity and artistic sensibility and helps them improve their musical instrument skills.
- Iunie: Muzica lui Enescu s-a auzit din nou în Casa de la Mihăileni în interpretarea Outis Quartet, patru tineri muzicieni care au studiat Cvartetul Nr. 2 de Enescu.
- June August: After a long period of working predominantly online, and since the pandemic restrictions were lifted, the children were brought together into small groups, in communities or in the courtyard of the George Enescu House, all together. They enjoyed meeting the members of the Outis Quartet, with whom they tested their musical knowledge and discovered new sounds and instruments, and they were also visited by teachers from the Botoşani School Inspectorate.
- August 29: Concert on the porch of the George Enescu House under the guidance of Mrs Paula Gavriluță, music teacher, at the end of the "Landscape and Sound Workshop".
- October: We undertook repair work on the Enescu House after the damage caused by the aggressive summer rains. We trimmed trees and cut down a lightning-damaged tree that could have endangered the house. We built a pergola behind the house.
- We have also hired a young man from Mihăileni as administrator of the Enescu House. Like any unoccupied dwelling, the house is in great need of constant care, careful observation and maintenance to prevent it from slowly deteriorating.
- November: We paved the dug and geotextile-covered driveway
 with gravel as an amphitheater space for summer events. The site is
 wide and inviting for outdoor activities. Preparations for the cold and
 wet season included making new vents for the basement as it was
 accumulating too much moisture.
- December: We printed the book Introduction to the ABCs of Music.
 An educational guide for teachers and parents by Diana Brătan, a publication available in the Foundation's online resource library as well as in printed form at Casa Enescu.

Concerts on the Siret River

- August 18-21: The first edition of the "Concerts on the Siret River" project launched by Pro Patrimonio Foundation, took place in three localities on the left bank of the Siret: in the garden of the George Enescu House in Mihăileni, at the Miclescu Manor in Călinești and at the Moruzi Manor in Vârfu Câmpului. During the four days of events, 30 musicians performed in front of an audience of over 300 people. The concerts were dedicated to the memory of George Enescu, whose 140th birthday was celebrated, and thus succeeded in promoting the values of the North Siret region, completing the local cultural offer with a high artistic proposal through the musicians' concerts and reaching an audience often ignored by local authorities and decision-makers.
- During the same period, in parallel with the "Concerts on the Siret River" project, the landscape architect Nicolas Triboi carried out an anthropological and landscape expedition on the Siret river, aiming to create a modern x-ray of the river's health through drawings, sound captures and dialogues with local people.

Partnership with "Future Acceleration Program"

• Throughout the year we have provided assistance in the "Future Acceleration Program" run by the UiPath Foundation, a program through which 29 children from socially vulnerable families in three communities near the Enescu House receive monthly scholarships, weekly classes for Romanian language and literature, Mathematics and English, material support consisting of school supplies, books, games, seasonal clothing and shoes, sanitary materials, food packages and Christmas gifts, tablets with dedicated programs and support to use them safely, medical assistance. As part of the programme, the children also participated in the U&I Summer Camp - a two-day summer camp organised in Mihăileni, as well as in various digital skills development and non-formal learning activities.

Golescu



he Golescu Villa and dendrological park in Câmpulung Muscel, AG, owned by Pro Patrimonio, represent an exceptional architectural and landscape ensemble. It offers a living model of saving, knowing and maintaining the cultural heritage through different ways in which to use and inhabit it.

Following the donation made by Irina Maria Golescu († 2002), the foundation received the mission to preserve, study and promote heritage values, taking over not only the architectural and landscape ensemble, but also all the original furniture, various objects for daily use, paintings, decorative art, carpets, lighting fixtures, library, letters and the family archive.

Pro Patrimonio tries to reuse a historical moment not by turning it into a museum, but by inhabiting and integrating it in everyday life.

This is one of the first practical examples, adapted over time to the local context that


the foundation faced in its attempt to implement its strategy of conservation and protection of heritage and landscape. In the vision of Pro Patrimonio, the Golescu ensemble works as a Cultural Landscape Observatory, with all its components (natural, anthropically modified - architecture, landscape, social values, community relations, housing practices, etc.), through projects and workshops carried out annually.

Vasile Golescu (1875-1920), the father of the Golescu twin sisters, built the villa with ground floor and first floor in 1909, as a holiday home on the western hill, overlooking the town of Câmpulung Muscel, and named it the Ştefan Villa, in memory of his son who died during the war of 1914. As a forest engineer who graduated in 1897 from the École des Eaux et Forêts de Nancy, Vasile Golescu designed the terraced park around the house (a garden park), adapting exotic and rare species, brought at the beginning of the last century from abroad, starting from the local natural forest.

- March: Villa Golescu hosts the first session of the Cărturești literary creation scholarships.
- June: Pro Patrimonio participated with two projects in the European programme "Rendez-Vous Aux Jardins", with the theme "Passing on Knowledge". The Open Day in the historical park of Golescu Villa in Câmpulung Muscel confirmed the importance of the ensemble in the local community.
- December: An extensive clearing of the slopes of overgrown vegetation and maintenance of the park takes place in preparation for winter and in order to eliminate the risk of branches or broken trees in strong winds or storms.
- Also in December, we won a project co-financed by AFCN, dedicated in particular to the experimental recovery of the culinary heritage of the Golescu Villa archive. The project The Culinary Diary of Maria Cantili Golescu - recipes, tastes, objects and experiments will take place in 2022 at Villa Golescu, with an educational component, along with the reactivation of the Honest Goods design and craft collection.






- 1. Detail from the Maria Cantili's recipe notebook, 1900.

Neamtu Manor



large part of the mansions in the southern part of Romania have disappeared in the past 30 years due to the faulty property restitution, disinterest and precarious education towards heritage, manifested both by the public authorities and the population.

The Neamţu Manor from Olari village, OT, (historical reference from 1841, probably before 1800), included in the List of Historical Monuments, is one of the few examples of civil architecture preserved in southern Romania. The mansion is part of the Neamţu Manor Ensemble, whose owner is now Pro Patrimonio, comprises a grain warehouse, a glacier, a communist canteen, partial traces of the former stables and annexes.

Donated to the Pro Patrimonio Foundation in 2016, the manor is in a state of degradation, having suffered from vandalism and neglected for a long time. As a result, it requires extensive and urgent conservation and consolidation works; it is a practical example of what Pro Patrimonio faces in implementing its strategy of saving cultural heritage and integration into the community.

In this case, the foundation adopted the following method of intervention: conservation and gradual rehabilitation, step by step; education workshops for children; adult education and awareness-raising workshops; community integration; creating over time a possible regional center for experimental studies and education.

Currently, Pro Patrimonio faces the following issue: a long process with many

unknown variables; insufficient funds; remoteness from Oltenia; complex search for a sustainable economic model for the manor and land; the village is located in a poor area, mainly agricultural (cereals, viticulture), with desertification tendencies due to climate change; in the locality there is a strong aging and depopulation wave.

The mansion is a landmark in the cultural landscape of the village and the area.

Experimental Centre for Studies and Education at the Neamtu Manor in Olari

- January: The partnership between Pro Patrimonio Foundation and UiPath Foundation is extended with a new project "Experimental Centre for Studies and Education at the Neamţu Manor in Olari". This programme aims to develop a sustainable educational ecosystem in Olt County, in the communities near the Neamţu Manor, in parallel with ongoing restoration (and refurbishment) of the historic monument.
- March: The group of children participating in educational activities at the Neamţu Manor over the last few years receive a creative mailboxmaking kit.
- Also during this period, we are carrying out an experimental planting scheme with seeds of historical plants on the farmland around the manor house. We are collaborating on this with Forgotten Herbs, an independent project of botanical exploration from the perspective of culinary archaeology, with a focus on food plants from the wild flora forgotten or lost by contemporary gastronomy.
- April: Seedling preparations in the new Experimental Garden at the Neamţu Manor; crowdfunding for the drilling and building of a well in the manor courtyard.
- June: Reviewing the work in the Experimental Garden. The seed sources were not the best and sprouted only in part. We will grow colored corn, but will also plant local corn and pumpkins. The soil is still arid, not retaining water.
- Also now, with the support of funding obtained in the Historical Monument Stamp Tax competition launched by the National Heritage Institute in 2020, we have developed and submitted for approval the projects necessary to obtain the building licence.
- October: With the support of ROMCIM, autumn work was carried out on the Experimental Garden of the Manor House, so that in spring we will have the land ready for agriculture.
- November: We ploughed all the areas previously used for alfalfa and other growing trials, thus preparing the garden for next year's experiments. We plan to continue testing the plantation of useful plant varieties for a productive drought-tolerant garden.

The mansion in the middle of the construction site

- March: For the start of the building site, from the beginning of April, the windows of the manor house were repaired and completed and a contract was signed with a firm specialising in the restoration of the manor house facades.
- April: Craftsmen work intensively on the façades of the mansion.
- June: Refinishing of the manor façade in progress. Over the lime plaster the craftsmen noticed a harder thinning layer which helped the drawn profiles to have straight edges. We analysed this layer with the help of the Technical University of Construction to better understand its structure and composition. We will do an on site lime plaster test. Many thanks to Pro Patrimonio France for the cremone bolts sent to Romania, we could no longer find this window closing system here.
- July: Façade repair works for the Neamţu Manor continued. New window frames for the mansion windows have also been fitted, which would allow new sashes to be fitted and properly used.
- Thanks to spring efforts and support, the manor has a new well, which
 now allows us to cope with the drought that has already set in. Despite
 the heavy rains in the country, there has been very little rain in Olari
 and the land is very dry.
- October: The windows are in place and the mansion prepares for the cold season by putting up winter protection in the beautiful Romanesque mosaic loggia upstairs.
- We recovered the fountain priorly situated until 1949 in the Neamtu mansion garden. This was moved away during the communist period, but recovered and returned back now in the memory of Mr. Serban Neamtu, the last mansion owner.
- November: Thanks to the donation of Mrs. Sînziana Coşeru, the daughter of Mr. Neamţu, the mansion received new pipes and gutters this late autumn.



Partnership with "Future Acceleration Program"

- June: Together with partners from the UiPath Foundation, we visited the schools and communities around Neamt Mansion.
- July: 20 children from vulnerable families from two neighboring villages, Bârza and Osica de Sus, joined the Future Acceleration Program. The secondary school children will receive integrated support to ensure better access to education and will participate in educational activities, both online and offline, some right in the Manor's courtyard.
- September: We hosted in Olari the U&I summer camp, organised by UiPath Foundation for the children in Future Acceleration Program, for which Pro Patrimonio provides support. A total of 20 children spent a couple of eventful days full of creative and stimulating activities, from smart city programming to science experiments, from virtual reality to robots and sports activities, with volunteers, trainers and teams from the two Foundations.

- March: Together with other specialists working in the same field and with the civil society we lobby for the City Hall to vote the suspension for one year of the coordinating PUZs of sectors 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6. We give interviews through Raluca Munteanu and Şerban Sturdza. Following all this public pressure the PUZs have been postponed.
- May: We sent an request for emergency classification of the building in the street for the building in 25-27 General Ernest Brosteanu Street to the Directorate for Culture of the Municipality of Bucharest. On 9 June 2021 it replied with a letter to initiate the classification procedure.
- June-July: In order to help those who ask us how to repair inter-war plaster, we have created a series on the website about practical ways and methods of intervention for different situations. We are currently working on a study to repair a fence base made of bush-hammered stone-like plaster, which was loose and cracked, and to clean graffiti designs on different types of plaster.
- July: We sent an open letter to the Romanian Government stating our support for the universal value of Roşia Montană, which has been reconfirmed 10 years after the first dedicated study.
- September: Pro Patrimonio asked the authorities to initiate the
 procedure for the urgent classification of the archaeological
 discoveries in the village of Sutoru, com. Zimbor, Sălaj county
 Gura Căpușului point. The local authorities have initiated the
 procedure for classification in group A.
- November: Despite the efforts, the Stamate Hospital in Fălticeni is demolished. The Pro Patrimonio Foundation joined the common rescue attempt with a request for classification. Unfortunately, the response received from the Suceava County Directorate for Culture cited a procedural flaw.
- Also now, on a background of lobbying through which architect Şerban Sturdza has constantly campaigned over the years, the Solacolu Inn in Bucharest is saved. The General Council of the PMB has voted on the resolution to expropriate the building and will begin urgently putting it into safekeeping.



Salva-Monument Guide

February - October: Pro Patrimonio Foundation develops an interactive online platform - the Salva-Monument Guide - to be integrated into the broad programme "In-Herit: National Cultural Heritage Information and Promotion Centre" carried out by the National Heritage Institute. To create this guide we set out to investigate through an online survey the types of situations and problems that people interested in the rehabilitation or refurbishment of historic buildings or architectural monuments in urban and rural areas may encounter. We have launched the web application and the eponymous guide. On 7 October, we presented to the public in Constanta the functionalities and components of the online tool Salva-Monument.

Residency programmes

- March: The first session of the Cărturești literary creation scholarships, in partnership with the Maria Association & Pro Patrimonio, took place in March at the Golescu Villa. The two fellows, Andrei Dósa (novel) and Ştefania Mihalache (short prose), lived for a month and each dedicated themselves to writing. The novel written by Andrei Dósa, *Multă forță și un dram de gingășie*, was published in spring 2021, shortly after the end of the creative residency in Câmpulung Muscel. It is the first book under the Cărturești scholarship and residency programme to see the light of print.
- October: The first musical residency of the "Academy of Music and Sound Studies" held by the Outis Quartet at the George Enescu House in Mihăileni takes place.
- November: The second session of the Cărturești Literary Creation Fellowships ends with the jury of 131 entries. In April 2022 we will host two more literary residencies at Villa Golescu in Câmpulung Muscel.
